HIGHLIGHTS FROM 2017/18

TOYOTA KIWI GUARDIANS

In August 2017, Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary became a Toyota Kiwi Guardians site. This programme encourages children and their families to get out in their local environment.

WEED CONTROL

Thanks to funding from WWF Habitat Restoration Fund, we were able to hire a contractor to complete weed control at the Sanctuary. This work has seen a large number of weeds removed. A grant from Weedbusters now means that our weed team will have the necessary equipment to continue this work.

KAIPUPU KIDS BOOK

The completion of "A Kids Guide to Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary & the Marlborough Sounds" was long-awaited and it is now in use for school groups visiting the Sanctuary.

KAYAK RAMP

The completion of the kayak ramp was a definite highlight this year. Many volunteers were involved with the design and build. It was also well supported by local businesses through in kind and financial donations.

TWILIGHT AND DAWN TOURS

Over the last year we held our first twilight and dawn tours. Both provided a different way to experience the Sanctuary.

OUR COMMITTEE

Kaipupu Point Mainland Island Society was established in 2006 and is a registered charitable entity. The role of the Society is to oversee management of Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary. Comprised solely of volunteers the management committee works with Kaipupu Point landowners, Port Marlborough and the Department of Conservation. A representative from each organisation sits on the management committee. The Society contracts two coordinators to complete biodiversity, education, maintenance, marketing, finance and administration tasks.


BIODIVERSITY

Our biodiversity focus for 2017/18 has been on predator and weed control. Through a review of the predator control programme changes to the layout and design of traps were implemented and we hope to see a reduction in mice and rat numbers at the Sanctuary over time.

Weed control was completed by contractor Ben Minehan from Weed Solutions and this work saw a large number of weed species treated. We are now working to find funding for next year. We are currently reviewing and updating our biodiversity plan with some exciting projects planned in the near future. Our goal of celebrating the diverse wildlife already present at Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary will lead us to surveys and long term monitoring. Data gathered will also provide insight into the success of our predator and weed control programmes. Bird counts at Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary continued in 2017 and we are now seeing significant increases in both bellbird and tui

numbers. Unfortunately the South Island robin transferred to the Sanctuary do not appear to have established. We are now investigating possible reasons for why this may have occurred.

Little Blue Penguins are now a common sight at the Sanctuary with new pairs discovered in boxes along the main track. Rehabilitated penguins from EcoWorld Aquarium are also adding to the population with releases of these birds occurring throughout the year.



PESTS

Eradicate rats and reduce mice numbers within five years and maintain it through effective pest monitoring and trapping based on best scientific practice.

Eradicate wilding pine and sycamore from Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary while controlling other weed species to low densities.

VEGETATION

Ensure that Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary has a healthy forest ecosystem with the necessary diversity to support a range of fauna.

AVIFAUNA

To celebrate the diverse wildlife already present at Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary with an aim of increasing the abundance and diversity of native bird species.

Where necessary we will improve biodiversity through successful reintroductions of appropriate species.

INVERTEBRATES

Investigate the species richness of invertebrates at Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary.

Investigate the distribution and abundance of weta at Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary

Improve the diversity and abundance of invertebrates through pest control and habitat restoration

LIZARDS

Determine which lizards are present at Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary and use this information as a baseline for long term monitoring.

To educate visitors and the local community about the importance of native lizard conservation, and to teach our volunteers practical lizard surveying skills.

PEST MANAGEMENT


The 2017-2018 year has been a very busy one for the pest team and predator control in general on Kaipupu Point.

Over the last two years, data from our catch result programme Catch IT, has shown even though we have kept on top of any incursions of possums, cats and mustelids, and kept the mice numbers down to very low levels, there has been a consistent small increase in rat numbers.

Due to this, the committee commissioned a review of the predator control on Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary at the beginning of 2018. It said a lot of positive things about our structure

in general, but it also said we could do some more practical things to make sure our rats, in particular, were under control.

Over the winter months we have been holding regular working bees to restructure the positioning of the traps, including adding more of them, shifting some, and creating a better





trap box for the mouse traps. The work that has been put into these changes has been phenomenal and has seen an increase in volunteer hours for June and July alone of at least 500 hours, with more to come. In the spring we will conduct more lure trials to ensure we are using and rotating the best lures and hopefully by this time next year non-toxin control will have the rat numbers decreasing too, with elimination of them entirely being our ultimate goal. Over the year the registered kills have

included 361 rats and 210 mice. Four possums and one mustelid have been caught in traps near the western end of the fence and near the jetty.

In total there will be, after the restructure is finalised, 112 DOC200 and DOC200 run through traps, 88 A24 traps, 8 A12 traps, 5 Timms traps and 500 mouse traps, set and checked weekly, within the reserve.

It is also estimated that, in the past year, 3195 hours have been put in by pest team volunteers and it can't be emphasized enough, our greatest appreciation of them, and what they are achieving on the sanctuary.

2018/19 WORK PLAN

- Continue implementing review recommendations
- Continue to refine volunteer systems
- Implement and stay concurrent with new proven technologies in predator control

EDUCATION

This has been a good year for environmental education with local teachers showing increasing interest in teaching children about our native environment and conservation. We have had contact in some form with kindergarten (Picton and Seymour), primary (Picton, Waikawa and Witherlea), secondary year 9 (MGC) to NCEA classes (MGC and QCC). We hosted about 240 children making a trip to Kaipupu, and met with about 390

children in their classroom learning about the Sanctuary and the wider environment. QCC year 7 students learned about planting and wetland ecology at Para Swamp. Picton's Room 1 class continued with regular Tuesday afternoon Kaipupu studies, these covered topics related to Kaipupu such as bird recovery projects to predator control to invasive weeds. Their "Say No to Agapanthus, Say Yes to Rengarenga"

project involved growing rengarenga plants and displaying them at the library free for people to take and plant in their gardens. The removal of agapanthus in the school required a huge effort!

A big asset we gained this year is the children's guide to Kaipupu created by Rachel Russell. This is proving valuable for teachers both during field trips and in the classroom.



MARKETING & PROMOTION

A BEAUTIFUL AND IMPORTANT SANCTUARY

"It took us around 90 minutes to walk round the well signed and informed trail in Kaipupu Point Sanctuary. We spotted a number of rare birds including the ridiculously large NZ Wood Pigeon - what a treat! Events such as the Earth Day Party, Garden Marlborough Fete and the Matariki Festival have been incredibly useful for fundraising as well as promoting the Sanctuary to the wider community this year.

Online we have grown our audience on Facebook to over 1000 followers, with some posts reaching over 6000 people. This reach is improved through connections with Southproud.co.nz and Destination Marlborough.

Guided tours of the Sanctuary have proven very popular with locals and visitors alike. Tripadvisor now rates the Sanctuary at 20 out of 58 attractions in Picton, with some great reviews promoting the Sanctuary and our wonderful guides. The introduction of the twilight tour in summer and the dawn tour over winter provided a new way to experience the Sanctuary.

We continue to look for new ways to promote Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary.

RELATIONSHIPS & PARTNERSHIPS

The Sanctuary is a project surrounded, supported and underpinned by our Community in so many ways. Our volunteers collectively devote hours of their time working in ways which develop, enhance and secure the future of our restoration area. Our key Rimu sponsors remain enthusiastic supporters providing funding and practical assistance. Mud House and Bluebridge Cook Strait Ferry have confirmed ongoing Rimu sponsorship while New Zealand King Salmon have doubled their financial commitment. Pest incursions from the port area are being tackled by our foundation partner Port Marlborough in conjunction with Picton Dawn Chorus, and the Department of Conservation continues to work closely with us as part of its' focus on environmental education and pest eradication. Other numerous sponsors provide assistance through funding or in kind and to them we offer our particular thanks. The Rata Foundation is playing an ever increasing part in our success through funds to support our specialist project managers. And an

approach has been made to Te Atiawa seeking active involvement from members of the Iwi and we look forward to strengthening this relationship in the coming year. The kayak ramp has been completed with the financial help of Wilderness Guides as well as funders Pub Charity and is providing access to many more visitors. Other visitors come via local commercial operators such as Beachcomber Cruises, Eko tours and Cougarline. Our education programme has fostered relationships with local kindergartens, primary and secondary schools. Although wasp numbers remain high in some of the bays of Queen Charlotte Sound again this year their numbers have not been high enough in Picton and Waikawa to allow the eradication programme to proceed. The project remains on hold at this stage with its partners' funding secured. The Powerhouse Reserve has again housed a plant nursery devoted to the production of native species to enhance the Good Neighbours' Halo Project the sale of which has benefited all of our organisations.



Our three Rimu sponsors, Bluebridge Cook Strait Ferry, Mud House and New Zealand King Salmon and two Kohekohe sponsors Wilderness Guides and Marlborough Gold Honey continued their support this year.




KPMIS has 238 members, 103 of which are life members. Volunteers at Kaipupu Wildlife Sanctuary spend on average 250 hours per month trapping pests, maintaining tracks, educating visitors, financial management as well as marketing and promotion. For our trapping team this has increased over the winter months to an average of 400 hours/month. Annually this is equivalent to \$90,000 in operational costs.

FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION

Kaipupu Point Mainland Island
Society continues to closely monitor
expenditure. This year to reduce
costs KPMIS made the decision for
treasurer Melissa Kellie to produce
the accounts in-house. The accounts
were then reviewed externally by
Mr Hugh Robbie who made the
suggestion to move the AGM giving a
more reasonable time frame for the
review. KPMIS continues to meet all
reporting conditions of the Charities
Commission.

Our main funding sources in 2017/18 were grants, donations and sponsorship, followed by sales and subscriptions.

Our information shop in Mariners Mall continues to be a central hub for our volunteers and members as well as visitors to the area. With updated displays and a range of merchandise sales continue to increase.
